Minister's Column

I don't know if it's ever happened to you, but even Ministers sometimes wake up on Sunday morning and ask themselves, "Should I go to church today?" Now, for me, obviously, the answer is (almost) always "yes." But, maybe for you, it isn't.

Oh, I know there are reasons for not being at the Fellowship on Sunday. Perhaps you're out of town or you aren't feeling well. Please enjoy your trip and/or keep your germs to yourself! Or, maybe you have guests (although we'd be happy to meet them!) All of us miss now and then. But, maybe it's just that you don't feel quite like getting up and making the effort.

Here's something you may not have considered when you pull up those covers and roll over for another bit of shut-eye. Our Fellowship isn't complete when you stay at home. It isn't just about you. We miss you when you're not here.

We show up on Sunday to be here for one another, not just for ourselves. We come to remind each other that we are important to one another, that we enjoy being together for worship and fellowship, that our lives are better because we have each other. Sunday services are a time to connect and reconnect, to pause and to be renewed, to find the comfort of like minds and similar values in a group of people we know and care for. It is an experience of being in the same place at the same time with others, to share something of meaning and worth.

Creating that experience together takes everyone doing what they can to make it a reality. Our worship associates prepare to create and hold a sacred space. Dave practices and presents meaningful music. I research and write an inspirational or thought-provoking sermon. We share our joys and concerns. Volunteers make coffee and monitor the sound system. Our RE staff and volunteers care for and nurture our children.

Then, we all show up. We make and respect the commitment it takes to be here, on time and in place, so that we can truly be a community of faith, together in celebration and co-creation as the opening notes of the Prelude begin on Sunday. We show up, even if the sermon topic may, at first, not seem like something we think we're interested in. Because we know that it isn't

just about the topic or the individual bits and pieces of what's happening. It's about us being together, sharing an experience, and being open to the wonder and mystery of what can occur when we take the time to be with one another.

We can't predict what serendipity may present itself because you and I and all of us choose to be in fellowship on Sunday. Whose smile do you need to see? Who needs to feel the touch of your hand? Who needs to talk to you? Who do you need to meet? Let's give ourselves the opportunity to experience magic as a community. Let's go to church!

Christmas Eve Service for Families

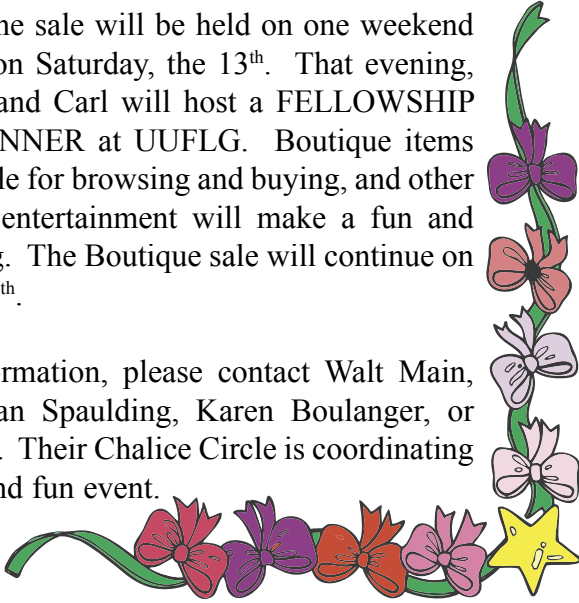

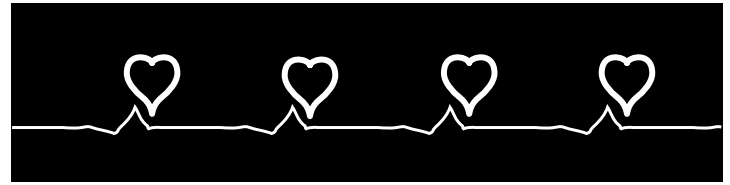

VALENTINE'S DAY KICK-OFF FOR PLEDGE DRIVE

The Finance Committee has set February 14 to initiate next year's pledge drive with a PLEDGE 2010 kick-off Celebration. Details will follow in January's newsletter. Meanwhile, please read the following important message about our challenge ahead.

Today we stand on the shoulders of the members of this fellowship who twenty years ago decided they needed a permanent home to grow their congregation. They dug deeply into their resources, and bought our lovely building, which we all cherish so much. Just four years later they dug again to create the addition which now houses our office, our RE classrooms, and general meeting room.

Last year we recognized that in order to fill the shoes of those builders and sustainers whose numbers are shrinking with each passing year, we need to attract new, energetic members who can continue building on the foundations laid by that far-sighted congregation. We began our community-building effort by installing Victoria Ingram as our first settled minister in forty years. We followed this by hiring a third teacher for our growing children's RE program and increased the time that our director can devote to managing her staff, working with the children and expanding the program. Finally, we appointed a music director to create a consistent, quality music program. There seems to be a high level of congregational approval for all these steps.



Our record recent induction of 16 new adult members, together with their 9 children, is a testament to the validity of this investment-for-growth strategy and we plan to keep it up. While member growth is key to our long range well-being, vitality and ability to convey the Unitarian message to the community around us, it grows our pledge income more slowly than one would expect because new member pledges tend to start at a much lower level than they eventually reach as those members get to know us better, and become more committed to our mission.

Starting January, Social Security will be increasing its monthly retirement benefit payments by nearly 6% to cover 2008's inflationary impact. This, together with the added expenses of paying for a settled minister, enlarging our RE program, and hiring a Music Director, means that we must significantly increase our pledge income in fiscal 2010. Just how much we will determine in the coming months, and will let you know well in advance of the kick off, so that you will have the time to reflect on your charitable giving budget, and how much of it you are able to apportion to your pledge.

Thank you for your past pledge support, and for taking the time to read this message.

Social Action

Marriage Equality

We are heartsick that Prop 8 passed, enshrining discrimination in our state's constitution, but also very proud of our fellowship for actively opposing this measure. You unanimously passed a resolution stating that UUFLG opposes any initiative that would amend the state constitution in an attempt to ban marriage for gay and lesbian couples in California. Victoria gave us a great sermon on Marriage Equality and personally endorsed the No on 8 campaign. Many of you signed "Vow to Vote No on 8" sheets on the deck and picked up information about how you could help defeat this initiative. Carl Ingram brought us a terrific LGBT film series in support of marriage equality. Some of you put up No on 8 yard or window signs at home. Some of you donated funds to the campaign. Some of you even phone-banked. And you provided the campaign with a gorgeous photo of a community of faith firmly opposing discrimination when you posed on the deck holding No on 8 signs and posters. Thank you for all you did!

The struggle for marriage equality is not over. There is a legal challenge of this amendment in the courts. As of 10 days after the election, 103,041 people had already signed a pledge to repeal Prop 8, launched by the Courage Campaign. Thousands of people have gathered in peaceful demonstrations and candlelight vigils across the state. Activist and writer Anne Lamott writes, "Hope begins in the dark, the stubborn hope that if you just show up and try to do the right thing, the dawn will come. You wait and watch and work: you don't give up." Let's continue to hope, to show up and work, and to stand on the side of love.

Green Holidays

The winter holidays is a time for well loved-traditions, time with family and friends and also many opportunities to improve our environment with "green holiday" practices.

Holiday Lights: Use low energy LED lights. Reduce the number of lights you use. Reduce the number of days or hours per day they are lit.

Entertaining: Make your holiday meals with as many locally grown and/or organic foods as possible. When you can't use real silverware and glassware, choose disposable products that are recyclable, biodegradable and made from unbleached materials. Use soy or beeswax candles, which unlike petroleum-based paraffin candles, won't emit toxic, sooty fumes. Make it easy for your guests to recycle bottles and cans by setting aside separate bins near the garbage.

Gift Wrapping: Wrap gifts in fabric remnants, scarves, thrift-store fabrics, old maps, magazine pages, posters, Sunday comics or reusable gift bags or boxes. Make your own wrapping paper by decorating packing paper or brown grocery bags. Make gift tags from last year's holiday cards. Reuse bags, boxes and ribbons from last year. Open gifts carefully and save the paper and ribbons for re-use. If you purchase wrapping paper look for recycled post-consumer content paper that can be recycled again.

Reduce Driving: Combine trips by shopping at just a few locations or trip-linking. Shop online to save on gas and stress. Research online or by phone before you drive.

Gifts: Give gift certificates for: a day of baby sitting, house or yard help, cooking, organizing vacation pictures. Give tickets to a play, concert, or movie, or gift certificates to restaurants. Give the gift of energy efficiency: handy tire pressure gauges, under-door draft guards, battery recharger...

Energy Savings: According to A U.S. Department of Energy study, if everyone replaced their conventional holiday light strings with LEDs, at least two billion kilowatt-hours of electricity could be saved in a month. Americans throw away 25% more trash during the Thanksgiving to New Year's holiday season than any other time of year. This extra garbage amounts to 25 million tons of trash. Whether incinerated or dumped in landfills that extra trash creates additional greenhouse gases.

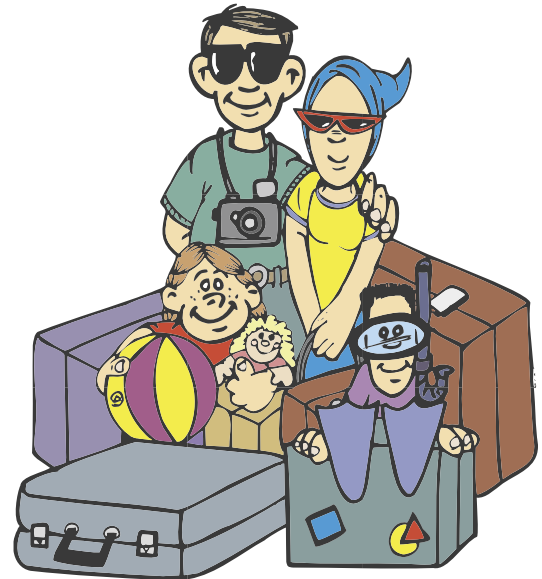
