September 11, 2001. This past April she testified in Alexandria, Virginia at the trial of 9/11 conspirator Zacarias Moussaoui. “I want to be a voice for reconciliation,” she told the jury. She will share with the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship her reflections on the character of this twisted man as he was dealt a full measure of American justice and American compassion. Words from your DRE

As we get ready for changes and the completion of this year, I leave you with announcements and suggestions.

First of all, congratulations to Jenny Heath and Kelly Smith on completing the OWL program at the UU of San Jose, our partner church. Our Whole Lives is based on the philosophy of comprehensive sexuality education, which helps participants make informed and responsible decisions about their sexual health and behavior. It equips participants with accurate, age-appropriate information in six subject areas: human development, relationships, personal skills, sexual behavior, sexual health, and society and culture. A celebration to honor their completion of this program will be at the UU of San Jose on June 4th. This will be a special time!

The OWL program is one example of a Religious Education (RE) class that our church offers for the youth. Sunday classes, field trips, "Coming of Age," and retreats are other examples. I would like to stress the importance of what the RE group offers to our children. We are currently still raising funds to support these efforts, so if you have not made a pledge to the fellowship please do so as soon as possible. With no RE program there will be no growth for our UU children.

Assuming that we will be able to raise enough funds, an idea for next year is to use the *Spirit of Adventure* curriculum with the k-5 class. This is on average an all boy class and I picked this topic because of its hands-on and exemplified activities, for example making a tower out of Jell-O because a Unitarian Universalist invented Jell-O, or learning about Frank Lloyd Wright, a Unitarian Architect. This curriculum is fun and educational. Goeff from the UU of San Jose has given us permission to borrow his curriculum books.

The youth group will be finishing the *Neighboring*

Faiths curriculum this month, and *Words to Live By* has been the proposed curriculum for next year. Sabine Omvik has volunteered to purchase and donate this book to the youth group class. Created by Judith Burch here are the topics this curriculum covers: reflecting our story, search for meaning, beliefs and values, spirituality and religions, faith and doubt, lessons from death and loss, and integrity and search for true self.

And, not forgetting about the preschool class, I want to encourage Michelle Sierra to keep being the lead teacher with the young children. She is one of the best teachers teaching preschool I have ever met. All the children and parents adore her, and she has been a pleasure to work and collaborate with. She is patient, kind, reliable, loving, and artistic. Keep up the good work Michelle!

My goal is to keep our religious education program a success, and with your help it will be. I encourage everyone to keep volunteering, donating snacks, and believing in this program as to offer the children a place to go to, increase their self-esteem, and increase their awareness of religious topics and events. Thank you to all the volunteers that have helped with teaching and have given food and drink donations this year. And, thank you for everyone that has made your pledge to continue the RE program!

Our Interim Minister for next year:

Reverend Carolyn Colbert

Introducing Rev. Carolyn Colbert who was approved at our annual meeting on May 21, 2006 to serve as Interim Minister for the coming year.



- Master of Divinity from Starr King School for the ministry 1982
- Preliminary UU fellowship November 1982.
- Ordination by Davis Unitarian Church, Davis, California, June 1984

For the past 8 years Rev. Colbert served as Minister of the Unitarian Universalist Church in Eugene Oregon, since 8/16/1998, during which time the congregation grew rapidly to a vibrant church awash in groups, events, and activities. Their current membership is 341. There are 170 registered children and youth. 140 of their members are parents with children in the RE Program. She admits to a prejudice, but feels like a very proud mother of a brood of successful grown children.

She has made the decision to retire from parish ministry, wanting to leave the congregation on a high note so they can have a good transition to a new minister who can be with them during the next stage of their journey. But she still has more to give.

An Accredited Interim Minister, Carolyn served three very different interim ministries earlier in her career.

- 1997 -1998: Interim Minister, Fresno UU Church, Fresno CA. A beacon of light in the center of California, this basically healthy congregation was recovering from the disappointing loss of their young minister.
- 1996 -1997: Interim Minister for 18 months, UU Church at Washington Crossing, Titusville, New Jersey. Her work included ways to reconnect what had become two congregations into one community.
- 1995-1996: Interim Pastoral Minister, UU Congregation at Shelter Rock, Manhasset, New York. She joined the ministerial team of three and was responsible for various pastoral functions of this flagship church, home of the Veach Foundation.

Prior positions:

- 1989 - 1995: Parish Minister, the UU Fellowship of San Luis Obispo County, CA, during a period of growth and renewal.
- 1986 - 1989: Extension Minister, Community UU Church, Kennewick, WA.
- 1987 - 1989: Consulting Minister for the Cascade Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, Wenatchee, WA
- 1982: Summer Minister, Monterey Peninsula Unitarian Church, Carmel, CA. Full ministerial duties.
- 1982 - 1986: On-call Minister, San Francisco Unitarian Church. During this period she was also caring for an ill daughter and her ailing mother.

Both her father and mother, Horton Colbert and Lynette Wood Colbert, graduated from Pacific School of Religion. Her mother's path led to her into full time Social Work. And her father served Universalist churches in California, and Minnesota. He served as the head of the Religious Education Department at Universalist headquarters in Boston and as Professor of Ministry at Starr King School

In returning to Interim Ministry, Carolyn is looking for a ministry that supports the strengths of a congregation in transition where she can contribute her community building talents, her 'joy in creating quality, excellence, and aliveness in worship', and her commitment to the growth, both in numbers and in depth, of a the congregation's shared life. According to Carolyn, a congregation in transition needs to help an Interim discern what the most important areas of concentration need be, so they can apply their skills and training to support the congregation in staying focused on those

Carolyn enjoys the challenge of creating worship that blends words, music, and the arts into a wholeness that celebrates life, heals us, and sends us out into the world to do the work of making justice.

Carolyn says, "If pushed to label my theology I'd call myself a practical mystic with universalist tendencies and a leaning toward pantheism. Growing up in our faith tradition I learned early on that we are free to adventure. For me, the unanswerables are all around us but are not to be feared. Being a UU is an invitation to explore -- to look, in Walt Whitman's words, up or down a road that stretches and waits for you -- to know the universe itself as a road, as many roads, as roads for traveling souls."

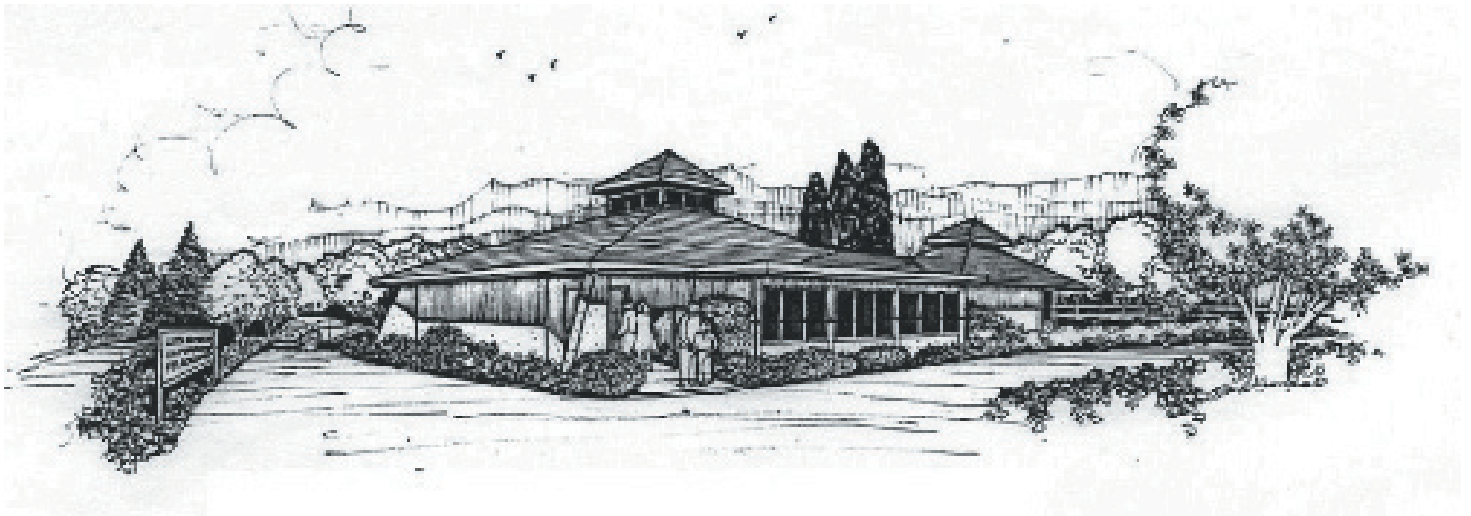
